Environmental Justice Conference to Focus on Clean Energy, Climate Change, Green Jobs, and Equity

The 6th Annual State of Environmental Justice in America Conference will continue the emphasis from last year's EJ Conference. It is clear that energy still consumes an inordinate portion of income for low-income and minority populations. It is equally clear that energy production presents numerous opportunities for small towns and rural communities to combine their resources with others to build sustainable communities and economies when done properly. For those reasons, the Conference has decided to revisit energy, environment, economics and equity.

The 2011 Conference introduced the Minority Alternative Energy Consortium. Historically, Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) and Historically Black Colleges and Universities have been anchors of support for minority and low-income communities. These institutions have the ability to combine resources with communities to help them achieve environmental justice. In addition to the training and technical assistance that these institutions can provide, they can be formidable advocates and partners for communities working for environmental justice, sustainability, jobs, economic development, health equality and other contributors to a wholesome quality of life.

The EJ Conference will continue to offer the programs from previous sessions. These include Meet the Agencies and Small Town Development Forum. Meet the Agencies allows community activists and others to request a face to face meeting with a Federal official, and the Conference works to facilitate the meeting. The Small Town Development Forum allows small towns, MSIs, HBCUs, community groups and others to present their challenges to an expert panel, and the panel provides advice and direction for reaching a sustainable solution. These two programs have proven popular and beneficial to participants.
